Warrant for Annual Meeting.

To James E. Merrill, a Constable of the Town of Falmouth, in the County of Cumberland,

GREETING:

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town of Falmouth qualified to vote in town affirs, to meet at the Town House in said Town on the fifth day of March, 1894, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, to wit:

First. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting, Second. To choose a clerk for the ensuing year.

Third. To hear and act upon the reports of Selectmen, Assessors and Overseers of Poor, Treasurer and Superintending School Committee.

Fourth. To choose all other necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

Fifth.. To see if the Town will grant and raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance and support of schools and the poor, and the repair of roads and bridges, and to defray all other necessary town charges for the ensuing year.

Sixth. To see what action the Town will take in regard to the pay of Town Officers.

Seventh. To see what method the Town will adopt to repair the highways for the ensuing year.

Eighth. To see what the Town will allow per hour for the labor of men, horses and oxen, on the highway.

Ninth. To see if the Town will vote to make a discount of one per cent. or more on all taxes paid within a stated time, and raise money for the same.

Tenth. To see if the Town will vote to accept the list of Jurors, as selected by the Municipal Officers, Treasurer and Clerk.

Eleventh. To see if the Town will vote to abate so much of the tax on personal property of Amos Leighton, as relates to a certain security held by him. Amount of tax \$19.50.

Twelfth. To see what instructions the town will give the Selectmen, relative to the proposed extension of "Shady Lane.

Thirteenth. To see if the Town will vote and authorize the Collector to collect all taxes committed to him, within one year from date of commitment.

Fourteenth. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer to hire money upon a written order from the Selectmen, in such sums as in their opinion may be necessary to meet the current expenses of the Town, or act anything relative thereto.

Fifteenth. To see if the Town will vote to build a culvert across the highway near the south end of Staple's Point bridge and raise money for the same.

Sixteenth. To see if the Town will vote to rebuild the Abutment at S. W. end of Presumpscot Falls bridge, and raise money for the same.

Seventeenth. To see if the Town will vote to improve a portion of the highway near the residence of E. M. Lang, as suggested by H. P. Merrill and raise money for the same.

Eighteenth. To see if the Town will vote to improve the portion of highway, near the house of John P. Jensen as suggested by H. P. Merrill and raise money for the same.

Nineteenth. To see if the Town will vote to rebuild Mill Creek bridge, and raise money for the same, or act anything relative thereto.

Twentieth. To see what action the Town will take to protect its clamming interests, and make all necessary rules and regulations therefor.

Twenty-first. To see if the Town will vote to build a shed at Town farm for storage of wood, farming tools etc., and raise money for the same.

The Selectmen give notice that they will be in session for the purpose of correcting the list of voetrs in said Town, and hearing and deciding upon the application of persons claiming to have their names entered upon said list, at the Town office at eight o'clock in the forenoon on the day of said meeting.

SCHOOL REPORT.

FELLOW CITIZENS:

Another school year has passed and we respectfully submit our annual report of the condition and progress of our schools. It affords us much satisfaction to be able to report more than the usual degree of success for the year now closing. This is due in a measure to the good feeling existing between teachers and scholars; and in a larger measure to the employment of competent and experienced teachers.

When we visit a school we can soon ascertain whether the pupils are trying to assist their teacher or whether they intend to annoy him. If the former is desired, the scholars will be studious so that when they are called out to recite they can answer their questions promptly; if the latter, you may notice some scholars, in the rear of the room, performing some amusing trick to amuse the other scholars.

An improvement in discipline has been observed in most of our schools since the law was passed requiring towns to furnish text-books. Much of the disorder occasioned by pupils sitting together to study has disappeared from our schools.

We do not wish to be understood that we see no imperfections in our schools. We observe many ways in which they might be improved. Some of our teachers use the topical method in recitations. Each pupil is assigned some topic and he is expected to give what information he can without any further questions from his teacher. We do not think this method could be used profitably in all branches of study, but, in our opinion, it would generally tend to give more thorough training. When questions are used they often include three-fourths of the answers to them. Therefore we would recommend a more general usage of the topical method by our teachers.

The habit of illustrating the difficult points in a lesson should be cultivated by our teachers. When some illustration outside of the textbook is brought into a recitation, the hard points are more readily grasped by the pupils.

The matter of "A Course of Study for the Ungraded Schools" is being discussed by prominent educators at the present time. While we are not prepared to say thay it can be successfully carried out in our schools, we think it is a matter worthy of our consideration. In the past, scholars have chosen their studies to quite an extent. Often they have left the common branches of education before they were thoroughly mastered to take up higher branches of study.

In closing we would urge you to take a renewed interest in our schools, believing that much of their future progress will depend upon the thought you bestow upon them.
